JACKSON CITY COUNCIL

Minutes from April 12, 2010 7:00 p.m. Regular Session

Jackson City Council met in regular session on Monday, April 12, 2010 at 7:00 p.m. at the Jackson City Council chambers. President Ron Speakman called the meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance was given, led by Mr. Smith. The Prayer was given, led by Mr. Powell.

A roll call was taken as follows:

Mr. Smith made a motion to approve the minutes of March 22, 2010 regular session, March 24, 2010 special session and March 25, 2010 special session, seconded by Mr. Fain. In a voice vote, all Council agreed.

VISITORS

Mayor Heath indicated that there were representatives from Westview Elementary present to explain their recycling campaign. Mrs. Tammy Jones stated that in December her class had read a book in regards to community service programs in Florida and her class was interested in doing such a project in our community. After discussing with Mrs. Biggs, they contacted the Mayor and ask if they could help promote the recycling program. They started in February and March, splitting up into four teams going door to door and asking if they recycle. If the response was no, they gave more information on the program, and received a great response. There were 10 visits, each lasting approximately 1½ hours, their goal was 100, they received 90 names. The city delivered the bins, the group also left flyers on the homes of people who were away. At the end of the project the students were ask to write an essay, out of those four were chosen as the top. She then ask the students to give a comment on the project, Shelby stated many residents told them they were doing a good job. Sarah indicated people were very nice they said no, but a lot of people wanted bins. Kendal stated a lot wanted to help and Lexie stated people want to help. Mrs. Jones stated this was a great thing and we received great feedback. Mr. Brown commended the students, stating that our recycling program had lacked publicity. Mrs. Jones stated that messages are still being left at the school and there is one apartment complex interested in recycling. Mr. Adams stated this was the right age group to focus on. Mrs. Biggs stated the parents of students stated they hear about recycling a lot, and the students help a contest making hats from recycled material, if any is interested contact the school.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

UTILITY

Mr. Brown stated there was no meeting; however Ordinance 15-10 is to eliminate the automatic 3% increase, as it was incorporated into the new 5 year rate, and this is just for documentation. Mr. Sheward stated that Mike and Linda Carper were present to request a water tap as there property did not have rural water available. Mr. Brown made a motion to grant, seconded by Mr. Fain, in a voice vote, all council agreed. Mrs. Colby asked if this was a home. Mr. Sheward replied a trailer.

BUDGET & FINANCE

Mr. Adams noted that the committee met on April 5th at 7:00, noting that Mr. Peters questioned the open meeting law, stating proper notification was not given. Mr. Adams stated it was announced in the local paper. Mayor Heath gave a presentation on the general fund, and the committee agreed to proceed one fund at a time. The Mayor and supervisors will attend the next meeting when scheduled. Mrs. Colby stated that in the presentation the Mayor made reference to only 5.5% of general fund monies come from residents. Mayor Heath stated that only 5.5% came from property taxes. He couldn't elaborate more as he did not have the information in front of him. Mrs. Colby stated that he made it appear as residents aren't

paying. Mayor Heath stated a lot of funds are generated through business and industry. Mrs. Colby said this was very misleading.

POLICE, FIRE & TRAFFIC

Mr. Smith stated he would like to make a correction to the minutes in regards to the possible 4-way stop on High and Main Streets, the committee recommended that the lights stay on, reduce timing. Mr. Smith made a motion to amend this in the minutes, seconded by Mr. Fain, in a voice vote, all members agreed. Mr. Smith also scheduled a meeting for next Monday at 7:00. Mayor Heath stated the Chief may want to be present to give a layout of operations. Maybe Mr. Detty to discuss case, volume and the types and we could have a better understanding. Maybe this could be an intertwined with the Budget & Finance if that is okay with the members. All agreed to hold a joint meeting. Mayor Heath noted if there were any questions that need specific answers please forward to him so he can be prepared at the meeting.

SERVICE - No Report

Mr. Elliott scheduled a meeting for April 26, 2010 to discuss the cemetery levy, requesting Mr. Henderson and Mr. Rasp is on hand to answer questions.

RAILROAD - No Report

BUILDING/RECREATION

Mrs. Colby stated the committee met before the regular meeting tonight to discuss window replacement in the Memorial Building, this has been put on hold to look at other things. The committee also discussed guidelines for use of the gym; the Administration is handling this matter. Mr. Powell asked about the Stay at Home. Mr. Sheward explained, due to a fire issue, the event will be held at the JMS this year.

CITY AUDITOR

Mrs. Sexton stated she had handed out the March report, she also handed out a sheet in regards to the cost allocations, this was requested information, and this needed to be brought to council. She went on to explain in 2002 the first year of cost allocations and so on. Point of reference in the green, with a 5-10-20 year repayment, this is with all funds participating, 2002-2008 quick estimate. The next column is the annual repayment, if council wants to recoup, those are assumptions. Mr. Humphreys wanted this presented. Mr. Speakman stated Budget & Finance could review. Mayor Heath asks the effect on utility rates. Mrs. Sexton stated that some funds or all owe money, this will affect rates. Mr. Smith asked her to clarify, repaying up to 2008. Mrs. Sexton replied yes. Mr. Smith asked would they to continue to pay on top of that figure. Mrs. Sexton stated pay in full every year. Mr. Smith asked why this was stopped. Mayor Heath stated for instance the utility funds ran low, water, to avoid an increase in rates we took away. Mrs. Sexton stated look at the top, half the money was reimbursed you will see it drop off. In those years council and the budget & finance committee decided what was feasible. The Electric fund paid in 2004/2005/006 the same amount, but not the full amount. Mrs. Colby stated the maximus study said it was not mandatory to take from all funds. Mrs. Sexton agreed, but Mr. Humphreys wanted to see what had been done in the past. Mrs. Colby stated in the past only utility funds, took what was needed, what this would do to those funds. Mrs. Sexton replied this effects a lot of funds. Mr. Speakman stated this was more information for the Budget & finance Committee.

Mr. Smith noted on the back page of auditor's report, trending is up in February and March. Mayor Heath stated he was uncertain as to why, possibly advancements, but at this time not prepared to answer. February numbers could have been due to snow removal. Mr. Smith asked them to keep and eye on this and watch trends.

Mrs. Sexton noted the general fund received approximately \$191,000 in interest from several large cd's that had matured, payed annually. This is good news.

LAW DIRECTOR

Mr. Detty gave his report, see attached.

MAYOR

Mayor Heath stated that Ordinance 16 and 24 were in regards to the pool came up with rates, \$2.00 daily admission for students and \$4.00 for adults. The pool made \$5,000 last year, we had horrible weather. We plan to open 10 days earlier this year, we hope this satisfies. In regards to management, we have two senior life guards, with knowledge of operations. They will receive a stipend for scheduling and concessions, this should save 50%. Mrs. Sexton asked the planned date to open.

Mayor Heath replied Memorial Day weekend, open Saturday, Sunday and Monday of that week, closed Tuesday and Wednesday as school is still in session. Mrs. Colby asked how much money the fund lost last year. Mrs. Sexton stated \$26,000 was lost. Mayor Heath stated this year money for chemicals will be taken from CIB funds, extra admissions and savings on staff should help. Mrs. Sexton stated last year the pool and concessions brought in \$14,000, we spent \$40,000.

Mayor Heath gave clarification on the Stay at Home. The State Fire Marshall was contacted on Easter weekend for code violations at the Methodist Church on an tip, in fear that the same may happen to the after prom party, Mr. Channel discussed with them about the gym and issues with decorating, there was an issue with the ceiling. In an emergency, there could be a lot of confusion. JMS will be better suited as they have sprinklers. We just want people to be safe, and we did not want to disrupt a 50 year tradition. Mr. Sheward stated this didn't just happen, he did speak with them last year, they chose not to pay attention or this information was just not communicated to new people of that committee. Mr. Powell appreciated the response and concerns for safety. Mayor Heath requested any questions about the budget will provide a form for specific questions and give to the Administration in writing.

SAFETY/SERVICE DIRECTOR

Mr. Sheward stated the Richland tunnel is complete, has photos for those who would like to view. The final payment has not been made yet, this project was done at no cost to the city, grant funding. Ordinance 18 and 19 are in regards to health insurance, vision, life, same carrier, same policies, pay additional cost out of MAX105, no increase. This does expire at the end of April, please take action. Ordinance No. 23-10 this is a transfer of funds, we lost in arbitration case over insurance. Mrs. Colby asked how much did the insurance increase. Mr. Sheward replied under 15%, will be using \$400,000 from MAX105, if you look at the past 3 years we are not paying any more out of the budget. Mayor Heath explained different rates for different businesses, there are many factors taken into account. Mr. Sheward also stated that contract negotiations will start in July and August with OAPSE and ASFME. Will provide a copy of the current contract upon request, seeking recommendations from council.
