LAW DIRECTOR

Mr. Detty gave his report, see attached.

#### **MAYOR**

Mayor Heath discussed Ordinance 36-10; it reduces the amount paid to licensed umpires. Last year we had very good umpires. He is preparing a recommendation for the general fund, scheduled a special meeting for June 8<sup>th</sup> at 6:00, will have recommendations on the direction of what we want our community to look like.

#### SAFETY/SERVICE DIRECTOR

Mr. Sheward explained Ordinance 37-10; the fire department would like to obtain a new brush truck with equipment. The current truck was purchased over 30 years ago by the Fire Department Association with bingo funds. New truck would cost \$65,174.00; they have \$18,000 in the budget and would like a loan from the city. Would like to see it returned to the association and let them sell, any money made from the sale of the current truck would go toward that balance. Mr. Smith asked if the \$18,000 was levy funds. Mr. Sheward replied yes. Mrs. Colby asked if we anticipated selling the old one. Mr. Sheward stated it is in good shape, if the city keeps, it has to be sold at auction, and if association sells it would be more profitable. Mr. Channel expected to sell for \$5000-\$7000. Mrs. Colby asked about other revenue. Mr. Sheward stated they have many projects, donations, DAV donations, expects to be repaid in less than two years. The association does have assets to sell if they were to disband, to repay the loan. Mr. Brown asked Mr. Detty if there were any problems giving back. Mr. Sheward stated they have discussed. Mr. Detty was uncertain. Mr. Brown asked him to please check. Mr. Sheward stated we need to get moving, the 2011 model won't be in production much longer. Mr. Speakman asked if he could have an opinion by June 7th so the Police, Fire and Traffic could discuss. Mr. Sheward suggested passing with a provision that Mr. Detty verifies. Mr. Smith requested it be placed on the agenda for the June 8th meeting. Mr. Channel stated the price is good for 60 days. Mr. Fain asked where the \$27,000 would come from. Mr. Sheward stated there is money in the fund, it was a grant match for the proposed fire house, and it doesn't look like we will get this grant. Mr. Eric Brown stated it is common practice to loan them money. Mr. Sheward stated we are anxious to process; we can leave the mini pumper out completely. Mr. Elliott asks if we used the truck for collateral. Mr. Channel replied yes, years ago, gave back to association. Mr. Sheward is concerned with the current price and possible loss of the 2011 model if action is not taken, as they would like to have in service by the fall. Mr. Smith stated he doesn't like making decisions in five minutes, the committee needs to review, and the administration should have brought this information sooner.

Mr. Sheward went on to discuss Ordinance 40-10, rules and regulation, pay for the Fire Department, please have a first reading and let the committee review. Ordinance 41-10 is an advance for the bridge to Aluchem. There is some money in the fund, and have applied for a grant, but there is no guarantee. Mr. Fain asked if they were working on the bridge yet. Mr. Sheward stated Rose Brothers will be the contractor, the purchase order is done. They are working at the substation now, hope to be there in 8-10 days, and 12-15 days before operational. Mr. Fain asked the Aluchem impact. Mayor Heath replied May  $4^{th}$  was the last shipment.

REPORT OF THE LAW DIRECTOR

The following is the Report of the Law Director:

# RAILROAD – LAWRENCE COUNTY RE TAXES

Nothing further has developed since the last meeting.

## RAILROAD - <u>City v US Rail</u> Suit

 We are in the process of arranging the discovery process, including depositions.

### RAILROAD – Inspections

- No new information on this matter which was reported at the last meeting.
- The proposed fines total \$56,000.00. Of this, \$6,000.00 concerns proposed fines for a rail line in Hamilton, Ohio which US Rail apparently operates. I am not sure why US Rail believes the City of Jackson should be responsible for those fines.
- I will keep you updated as matters proceed in this issue.

# JACKSON RUN SUBDIVISION (Cherry & Elm Streets)

Since the last meeting I have spoken to a representative of the developer of the subdivision. I informed that person that I needed all the documentation concerning the roads in the subdivisions, such as how the roads were constructed, when, etc. I also indicated that core drilling may be required. The representative told me I would get that information as quickly as possible. As of 2:00 p.m. on Friday, May 21, 2010, I have not yet received any information.

 I assume Council desires to take no action until further information is obtained and verified.

### BROADBAND MARKETING CONTRACT

- Since the last meeting I have been presented a proposed agreement to allow the Jackson County Economic Development Board (JCEDB) to market broadband sites on City property.
- I have not yet prepared an Ordinance as I believe this should go to the appropriate committee for consideration and recommendation.

# ORDINANCE 36-10 - Compensation of Umpires

- Obviously there was some confusion at the last meeting concerning Ordinance 36-10, which was amending the compensation rates for umpires in the Baseball/Softball program.
- The current compensation rates for umpires is set forth in Ordinance 48-08, which is attached to this report.

This Ordinance replaces any and all prior ordinances relating to compensation rates for umpires, and any and all previous and prior ordinances concerning compensation rates for umpires are hereby null and void as to the issue of compensation of umpires.

This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency Ordinance, Section Two. necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City of Jackson, in that it is necessary to enact the pay rates as soon as possible so umpires may be paid for the 2008 Baseball/Softball season. Therefore, this Ordinance shall go into effect upon passage and approval by the Mayor, as provided in Ohio Revised Code Section 731.30.

Section Three. In the event this Ordinance receives a majority vote for passage but fails to receive the required number of votes to pass as an emergency, then this Ordinance shall be deemed to have passed but with no emergency clause and shall take effect at the earliest time permitted by law.

# The City of Jackson Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP)

General Outline of Services

The purpose of the City of Jackson's Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) is to remove the contaminates, caused by human activity, from wastewater (sewage). In short, it is the responsibility of the Wastewater Treatment Plant to protect the public health and one of Jackson's natural assets, the Salt Lick Creek.

Wastewater treatment is a critical part of modern life. If past practices of dumping untreated sewage into the streets and waterways continued through today (and in many areas of the world it still does) there would be rampant outbreaks of waterborne diseases, unimaginable pollution of our waterways and the environment that would be uninhabitable to life, Hunting and Fishing.

While ancient civilizations had created sewers to carry waste away from populated cities wastewater treatment is relatively a new concept. As scientific knowledge grew it became evident that untreated sewage that entered into waterways that supplied drinking water would create outbreaks of cholera, diphtheria, typhoid, and numerous other diseases.

When you stop to consider it, water affects nearly every part of life in America. So much so in fact that each person uses about 80 to 110 gallons per day. Imagine if every time you took a drink of water that you wondered if it would make you sick. In many parts of the world that is a very real part of life. Water quality is one of the most pressing issues in our country. There is a limited supply of clean drinking water, remember the water you drink today at one time passed through something somewhere.

WWTP Staff of 10 personnel together this staff operates and maintains the Treatment Plant to meet or exceed Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA) permit limits.

### Chief Plant Operator

#### Number of positions 1

Supervise the daily operations required for the Wastewater Treatment Plant to operate within the EPA parameters established by the City's NPDES permit.

This position is supervised by the Wastewater Treatment Plant Superintendent

- 1. Responsible to understand and implement the details of the approved operational control plan. This will include adjustments to feed rate settings, pump run times, tank withdrawal rates and durations, and sampling.
- 2. Perform maintenance functions as needed to keep the Plant operational.
- 3. Coordinate sampling and testing assignments with the laboratory staff.
- 4. Monitor and report all equipment which exhibits a need for maintenance tasks. Forecast the urgency for completing these tasks.
- 5. Assist in all maintenance functions required to operate the Plant within the specified EPA parameters.
- 6. Complete daily records and reports as directed by the Superintendent.
- 7. Inventory the materials on supply and advise the Superintendent when additional inventory will be required.
- 8. Provide guidance to other operators.

#### Plant Operator

#### Number of positions 2

Perform the daily operations required for the Wastewater Treatment Plant to operate within the EPA parameters established by the City's NPDES permit.

This position is supervised by the Wastewater Treatment Plant Chief Operator

- 1. Carry out the operational details presented in the approved operational control plan. This will include adjustments to: valves, feed rate settings, pump run times, tank withdrawal rates and durations, and sampling.
- 2. Perform the necessary sampling and testing and coordinate the delivery of the samples with the laboratory staff.
- 3. Report all equipment which exhibits a need for maintenance tasks.
- 4. Assist in all maintenance functions as required to maintain Plant operations.
- 5. Submit daily records and reports as directed by the Chief Operator.
- 6. Perform plant rounds to monitor and record the operating status of the Plant.
- 7. Perform yard maintenance functions.
- 8. Maintain the security of the Plant grounds and records.
- 9. Perform maintenance tasks when requested.
- 10. Perform janitorial tasks necessary to maintain the cleanliness of the treatment facility.
- 11. Calibrate chemical feed equipment, and instrumentation.
- 12. Perform daily sampling, and laboratory testing. Record the testing results and enter the data into Operator 10 system.
- 13. Enter the appropriate information into the Plant log book.
- 14. One operator is also assigned Sludge hauling and takes most of the good weather days to keep up with the Cities production.

### Wastewater Treatment Plant Secretary

#### Number of positions 1

Perform secretarial functions to support the operations at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Also Provides same service to Electrical Department, Collection and Distribution and the Water Department.

This position reports to the Wastewater Treatment Plant Superintendent.

- 1. Perform typing of forms, reports, letters, and miscellaneous documents.
- 2. Properly file the documents received and sent from the Treatment Plant. Maintain the existing filing system, and create filing system when requested.
- 3. Provide support to other departments in the City to cover for other secretaries that are not available for work.
- 4. Order supplies and materials for the operation of the Treatment Plant.
- 5. Perform Prevailing wage interviews and approves Certified payrolls on all required projects through out the City.
- 6. File and maintain the archives for construction plans and other records and documents.
- 7. Support the operations in the wastewater laboratory when requested.
- 8. Perform routine secretarial functions.
- 9. Perform wastewater laboratory duties in the Wastewater Laboratory Technician absents

#### Skilled Labor

Number of positions 1

Perform miscellaneous functions within the Wastewater Treatment System.

This position is supervised by the Wastewater Treatment Plant Chief Operator

- 1. Carry out the daily tasks assigned. (i.e. Mowing, sludge hauling, assist with equipment maintenance, painting, cleaning). Sludge hauling takes most of the good weather days to keep up with the Cities production.
- 2. Report all equipment which exhibits a need for maintenance tasks. Assist in all maintenance functions as required to maintain Plant operations.
- 3. Cross-training with other Plant personnel.
- 4. Work in the collection system performing miscellaneous tasks as directed.
- 5. Maintain the security of the Plant grounds and records.
- 6. Submit daily reports for land application program.
- 7. Take soil samples for the fields where sludge is applied.
- 8. Operate the sludge hauling and application equipment.
