LAW DIRECTOR

Mr. Detty gave his report, see attached.

MAYOR

Mayor Heath gave a report on Ordinance No. 61-10, see attached.

SAFETY/SERVICE DIRECTOR

Mr. Sheward passed out June reports for Fire Department and Police Department. He does have a six month report if anyone is interested in viewing. He commented on the Bellisio spur has had 5 deliveries, holding up good. After six deliveries the contractor will return to tamp and level. Mainline rehab occurring, some problems, these were created by US Rail not maintaining the track. Issues with replacing ties, plates are gone, not there to be reused. There is no extra money to build into. The dump truck has derailed twice due to bad track, they have repaired. US Rail has not done vegetation spraying. The tamp machine uses lasers, can't accurately project targets. Some issues try to find a solution. This is ongoing, hope to be successful.

Mr. Sheward requested an executive session to discuss contract negotiations. Mr. Smith asked about the power outages (several) and about an injured employee, some people lost equipment. Mr. Sheward stated he received an arc burn on the face, he will be kept overnight, and he will be fine. Mr. Smith asked if proper procedure had been followed, could have this been done on the weekend? Do we do this live? Could this been avoided? Mr. Sheward replied this is always done live. Mr. Smith asked to look at the procedure, or should we have scheduled an outage. Mr. Detty stated we may need to stop, area we do not need to be covering in open session. Mr. Sheward stated the employees are highly trained, they know procedure, and this was simply an accident. Loose wire into secondary, this is a dangerous occupation, it was flash just like in welding, and he could have been seriously injured. Mrs. Colby asked about the other outages, lights dim, what is causing this. Mr. Sheward stated it was loss of line, until repaired it was operating on one line. Sub systems need replaced, heavy usage due to the hot weather, we are using older equipment, we ran generators to stop peak. Mrs. Colby thought that is why we built the substation. Mr. Sheward stated the substation has nothing to do with this. Mrs. Colby stated this hurts businesses. Mr. Sheward stated we went several years with no outages, the subsystems have received no upgrades, and they are 20+ years old. Veterans Drive is only one running now. Amp generators could not be used due to disconnection.

Mr. Brown asked about paving and dura patch updates. Mr. Sheward stated it will be next week for the bids, they have been dura patching as time allows, short handed and holidays, extra garage runs this takes time. Mrs. Colby asked for a list of streets to be paved. Mr. Sheward replied we have a list, but are unsure the amount that will be paved. Mr. Colby stated she would like to see the list. Mr. Sheward stated he will after receiving bids. Mr. Elliott asks why the court community service workers could clean with sickles. Mr. Sheward stated there is 90 miles of track. Mr. Heath stated it needs sprayed. Mr. Sheward stated they only have sprayed it where it has to be done, like on hills, no where else, except maybe in Oak hill. Would like to point out, \$5000 worth of chemicals, they will spray if we buy.

Dear Council member,

I will be presenting Ordinance 61-10 on Monday night, dealing with the money owed to those who have worked in the recreation program as either program coordinators or concession stand workers.

Attached is a sheet that shows as of July 1, for the concession stand operation the documented income so far, what we can earn from the sale of remaining product, some of which will be sold to the pool, what current concession stand employee costs had been to that date, the estimated amount left for concession stand workers, which I learned on Thursday is \$430.71, and the amount of product purchased, plus the estimated amount purchased from the remaining open purchase order.

So, as you can see, if we sell the remaining product and all other estimates are accurate, the concession stand at the ball fields should clear about \$800 this year after all expenses, including the concession stand employees.

The reason why the additional amount needed is \$1,220.00 is that we still owe one coordinator \$750 as that money was used to pay concession workers as both are in the same salary and wages line item. The additional \$40 is just to make sure there is no error if something needs to be recalculated.

To help alleviate some of the concerns, to cover this amount I have transferred money from two other line items since fortunately it appears we did not need all that was appropriated in those line items, so even with this additional appropriation, there is no addition to the recreation budget.

Thus, we will just place the additional amount we would have appropriated for this into our reserve and be able to have it for next year.

Hopefully, we can move forward on this Monday night so these individuals can be paid.

COST ALLOCATIONS/RENTS & RIGHT-OF-WAYS

Dear council member,

For your information, here is a brief time line of the utility cost allocation/rents and right of ways issue involving the city of Jackson.

The first two sheets are from the 1991 annual city audit where it clearly states the methodology employed by the city that year as being correct.

The next page shows the amount questioned by the state auditor from 1989 through 1999, including the 1991 amount where the audit of 2002 issued a \$432,260 finding for adjustment when the state auditor in 1992 said specifically it was correct.

The next three pages are the presentation we made in April, 2008 to the state auditor's office in Columbus involving Jack Detty and myself. At that time, the indicated they could approved our plan over uncertainty as to whether "Home Rule" might prevented them from questioning it, as well as to whether they had a defined policy concerning it.

My question is, if they didn't have a defined policy in 2008, they must not have had one in 2002 when they made the \$6.1 million finding for adjustment.

The remaining pages are Ordinance 67-09, passed by council last year, the letter Jack Detty sent to the state auditor's office regarding the ordinance, the reply from the state auditor's office and Mr. Detty's opinion regarding the reply.

RENTS AND RIGHT-OF-WAY PROPOSAL

The following is a copy of the presentation made to the State Auditor's Office that was not accepted for the city's general fund to assess to the city's utility funds:

- (1) The previous report was compiled under a prior city administration. The city admits some of the numbers used for calculation purposes were not correct. The methodology used was developed by Maximus, who the city was advised by the state auditor's office to hire for this process.
- (2) When the new city administration took over, correcting this report was made a priority. The situation was handicapped by the fact the lady who compiled the report for Maximus is based in Texas and she possessed all of her worksheets on how the compilations were arrived at. In addition, the city engineer who provided her with the information left the city's employment on December 31, 2007, prior the new administration taking over.
- (3) Since information from Maximus on how the various numbers were determined was not available, and it was known the city's calculations were not necessarily correct, the new mayor , Randy Heath, elected to have the city re-calculate its numbers to ensure accuracy and elected to bypass Maximus in determining a new methodology since prior efforts to include Maximus in the process had been fruitless.
- (4) The new methodology was developed by Mayor Heath, who possesses a Bachelor Of Science Degree in Mathematics from the University of Rio Grande.
- (5) First, the true amount of feet and miles the city has in water, sewer and electric lines were re-calculated for accuracy and is outlined in detail on the maps that have been presented. This maps show the exact location of each line the city is asking to be justified, both within the city limits and outside the city limits.
- (6) The previous methodology using the linear foot model, per se, was not used moving forward because there was not a clear understanding of the process Maximus utilized, and thus made it impossible to respond to the questions of the state auditor's office concerning that methodology.
- (7) In fact, two different methodologies were now utilized. First, the most simple method was to take five percent of the gross revenue of our city water, electric and sewer operations for 2007 for rents and right-of-ways. The five percent calculation is a commonly used number by some utilities, such as cable TV franchises, in determining this amount. The exact numbers will be reviewed later in this document.

- (10) As for the numbers used to justify the second methodology, they are as follows:

Acres In City = 4,918 (according to county auditor figures)
Sqaure Feet In City = 214,266,852 (43,560 sq. feet in an acre)
Valuation Of All Property Land Only Value Within City = \$102,814,790
Valuation Of All Prop. Total Property Value Within City = \$464,476,760
(according again to county auditor's office)

For The Entire City:

Land Only Appraised (Real) Value = \$0.48 per square foot
Total Property Appraised (Real) Value = \$2.17 per square foot

Total Feet Of City-Owned Property Containing Utility Lines
Water = 194,573; Sewer = 146,060; Electric = 252,312

Conclusion

In conclusion, the city should be allowed \$854,435.52 if just the land only appraised value is applied, be allowed \$953,447.65 if you use the five percent of gross revenue methodology, and be allowed \$3,862,760.58 if the total property appraised value is utilized.

**CITY OF JACKSON, OHIO
RENTS AND RIGHT-OF-WAY PLAN
FOR CITY OWNED UTILITIES**

The City of Jackson, Ohio adopts this plan and policy for the reimbursement of rents and rights-of-ways used by the City's utilities. The City finds that the streets, alleys, and other public areas used for right-of-way access to deliver services to customers are across properties required to be maintained by the City's General Fund.

INTRODUCTION:

The City of Jackson has studied various plans for reimbursement of rents and rights-of-way, including a gross revenue plan and a footage plan based upon number of feet and property valuations.

The City has determined that the gross revenue methodology best serves the City of Jackson, Ohio, and such plan shall be adopted as the basis for the recovery of reimbursements of rents and rights-of-way used by the City's utilities.

The amount of five percent (5%) of gross revenues has been determined to be a fair and reasonable reimbursement amount for public utilities which use a municipal right-of-way.

POLICY:

The City of Jackson hereby adopts the policy that up to five percent (5%) of the gross revenues of the City's utilities which access and use the City's streets, alleys, and other public areas for the delivery of services to customers, may be paid to the City's General Fund, as and for a fair and equitable fee for using the City's streets, alleys, and public ways as and for rights-of-ways for servicing customers.

Dear Mr. Humphreys:

Thank you for your letter including a copy of Jackson City Ordinance No. 67-09, which sets forth a rent and right of way reimbursement plan. You have asked for the Auditor of State's comments and concerns regarding this plan.

The Auditor of State is not statutorily authorized to render legal advice to you, nor are we permitted under audit independence standards to engage in management decision-making. As stated in previous audit reports, during an audit, we will review the methodology used to calculate the right of way amounts. Additionally, for audit purposes, we will look for compliance with Ohio Law, including but not limited to, Ohio Rev. Code Section 4939.05, which states in pertinent part, that:

Public way fees levied by a municipal corporation shall be levied only on costs that the municipal corporation both has actually incurred and can clearly demonstrate are or can be properly allocated and assigned to the occupancy or use of a public way. The costs shall be reasonably and competitively neutrally allocated among all persons occupying or using public ways owned or controlled by the municipal corporation, including, but not limited to, persons for which payments are waived as authorized by division (B) of this section or for which compensation is otherwise obtained. No public way fee shall include a return on or exceed the amount of costs reasonably allocated by the municipal corporation to such occupant or user or pursuant to any reasonable classification of occupants or users.

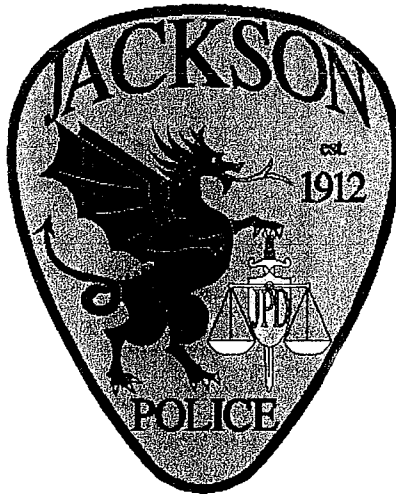
