JACKSON CITY COUNCIL

Minutes from July 11, 2011 7:00 p.m. Regular Session

Jackson City Council met in regular session on Monday, July 11, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. at the Jackson City Council chambers. President Ron Speakman called the meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance was given, led by Mr. Elliott. The Prayer was given, led by Mr. Powell.

POLICE, FIRE & TRAFFIC - No Report

Mr. Sheward stated he would like to schedule a meeting to be held at the fire house with the committee members

SERVICE

Mrs. Colby stated the dog park has not been started; administration will not do, after council voted. Mayor Heath replied measurements of both areas were taken, the area close to Walgreen's is 22,000 s.f. and the area at Eddie Jones is 32,000 s.f. Mr. Sheward had some reservations about the distance and asks council, not really a need for 32,000 s.f. now. At the Manpower site, some fencing is already in place. Mr. Sheward stated there is no vehicle access to the site, issue of waste stream source, has to have vehicle accessibility. The city has in place an ordinance that doesn't allow animal waste in the garbage or sewer. There is a company that will provide a port a potty for \$500 per year, this can handle both animal and human waste, and they will clean weekly with out putting in the waste stream. There is also no parking near the Eddie Jones Park; this could create a health and safety hazard. Mr. Smith stated this area was picked with the assistance of Mayor Heath, meetings were held, this issue was never brought up, and we are shooting our self in the foot being negative. The goal is to walk and have room for expansion. I am very put off by this discussion, presented without for sight. Mr. Sheward sated he had sent a letter to Mrs. Colby and she read it several weeks ago. Mr. Smith stated that is when you suggested the area across Harding. Mr. Sheward stated he just wants an area with parking. Mr. Smith stated we didn't hear this debate with t-ball fields, there was not much discussion at all. Mayor Heath stated he just wanted to put out the measurements. Mrs. Colby stated we can make any size we want. Mayor Heath stated we will discuss tomorrow. Mr. Smith stated we need room for expansion, maybe a small dog area, you agreed on this spot.

Mr. Smith called for a recess at 7:16 p.m., seconded by Mr. Powell. In a voice vote, all members agreed. Mr. Smith called to return to regular session at 7:19 p.m. In a voice vote, all members agreed.

Mrs. Colby stated that neither she nor Mr. Brown liked the location by Manpower. Mr. Smith asked the administration to offer a solution, come up with an alternate location.

RAILROAD - No Report

Mr. Fain stated that US Rail had requested a meeting. Mr. Kirby stated this would not be beneficial. Mr. Fain stated he had received a letter from Mr. Lewis about the insurance. Mr. Kirby stated he spoke to him and they have a copy of the policy.

BUILDING/RECREATION - No Report

CITY AUDITOR

Mrs. Sexton stated the monthly reports had been emailed. We have received April/May estimated payments from US Rail. June will be past due on July 15th. No breakdowns were provided; we did email requesting this information. Mr. Kitchen stated we have a right to this information. Mr. Kirby stated we are part of a lawsuit now; this is not for public session.

LAW DIRECTOR - No Report

MAYOR

Mayor Heath stated he had passed out an update on the updated list of participants in the Freemont AMP project. Mr. Sheward went to a meeting last week, stated there are 89 communities on board, some ask for more electric than is available. We are working on a list of streets for paving and striping, if you come across any please forward to Mr. Sheward or myself. Mr. Powell requested a preliminary list. Mayor Heath stated it was not quite ready. Mr. Sheward stated funds were being returned tonight in ordinances and then with accurate numbers in the 228 fund, we will have a more accurate list.

SAFETY/SERVICE DIRECTOR

Mr. Sheward stated he had requested permission for bridge replacement, awarded two, Dickason Street to be done in 2014 and Harding in 2016, this is an 80/20 match, and we also have to pay engineering cost. Meet with the state next week, we have enough time to the 228 funds available, this is a positive project. Resolution 123-11 is for permission for FEMA grant to replace the 1984 fire truck, 95% match. The meeting with AMP last week went well, committees being developed, moving forward. He requested a short executive session to discuss contracts. Mr. Smith asks if these two bridges were in the most dire need. Mr. Sheward stated these are on the replacement list, eligible for funding. Mr. Smith asks if they will make it until 2014 and 2016. Mr. Sheward replied we inspect every year, Harding and Main is critical, we pay \$8000 a year for inspections. Mr. Speakman stated he had replaced both those bridges.
