UTILITY

Mr. Brown introduced guests, Tom Woltz and Tom Thacker, who were there to inform people of the new Emergency Alert System.

Mr. Woltz stated the sign-up is available on the Jackson City website, jacksonohio.us and click on the yellow icon that says Emergency Alert System. Anyone who has a cell phone and would like to get the alerts would need to register on this website or pick up a form from the utility office.

Hyper-reach can contact people by e-mail, voicemail, and text messages. A lot of other people use this system also. The City of Jackson is a pilot for smaller customers, so they were able to get the system for about \$2,500.00 per year. The system uses calling lists to contact people. All landlines are currently on the system.

The first time the system was used was for the water tower project. It was used to alert David Avenue residents about the project. There were about 1892 contact methods that were sent out. It took about 20 minutes for it to reach that many people. 196 were not reached due to errors such as, phone disconnected, bad e-mail addresses, busy, etc. 87% of the contacts were successful.

Mr. Brown asked what number people see when it calls. Mr. Thacker said the number displayed is 740-688-3147. Mr. Brown stated he would like to see City of Jackson displayed when it calls the contacts, so people would know to answer it.

Mr. Woltz said they are in the process of getting the 911 data base so they can reach more people. He said travelers will also be able to use this. There is a digital certificate and password needed from FEMA in order to make this available.

Mr. Elliott asked if someone was going to be gone for a long period of time, should they register their cell phone to get the alerts. The response was yes.

Mr. Sheward asked if the city does the weather alerts or the National Weather Service and Mr. Woltz said it is the National Weather Service.

Mr. Sheward thanked Mr. Woltz and Mr. Thacker for working on this project. It is a great system with not a lot of cost.

BUDGET & FINANCE- No report.

POLICE, FIRE, & TRAFFIC

Mr. Kitchen stated the police and fire run reports were handed out. He also wanted to remind everyone of the Police, Fire, and Traffic committee meeting that will be held at 6:15 p.m. on August 11, 2014 in regards to the panhandling situation and other topics.

Mr. Foster stated he would like to know about the laws for golf carts being on the streets. They need to do something about the ones that are not legal. Mr. Sheward said some are inspected and licensed for street use. They have to meet certain criteria. Mayor Heath said they explored this issue a long time ago.

Mr. Brown was concerned with the amount of speeding tickets issued in a month. There were only 2 listed on the report. He said there needs to be more enforcement. Mayor Heath said he spoke to Chief Eisnaugle after the last meeting regarding this and he will talk to him again. Mr. Brown said maybe they could place some of the cars no longer in use in different places and it might slow people down.

Mr. Hensler asked why the speed limit on Burlington Road is 40MPH. It is not in the city limits after a certain section of the road. The city can't set that speed limit on this section.

CITY AUDITOR

Mr. Reed stated they received their first check in regards to Ordinance 51-14 and they are required to keep this money in a separate line item.

Mr. Reed said the police department has used pretty much all of their jail expense money. They need more money. The Mayor stated he thought the funds were low at this time and Mr. Reed agreed.

LAW DIRECTOR

Mr. Kirby said the hold has been released on the Freeman property, so something can be done with it now.

MAYOR

Mayor Heath stated they have secured a contract to paint the Ice Plant. It is a local contractor. They will start on it soon. He said when they have projects and council knows of someone interested, let the Service Director or Mayor know so they will have a chance at it. Mr. Queen asked why they didn't bid this job out. Dear Council member,

There are two ordinances tonight that I hope you will approve, if you feel passage is warranted.

Tonight will be the second reading regarding the purchase of the recycling packer truck.

There are two distinct reasons why suspending the rules and passing this ordinance will be beneficial to the city.

First, the sooner we can put the packer truck into service, the sooner we can take the truck off of the recycling route and hopefully save the wear and tear on that truck.

Currently, we have to make a trip to the landfill every day to dispose of our recyclables. It has been estimated that we could cut those trips down to either only one or two trips a week when the new truck is in service., thus saving money in our garbage fund just from the reduced trips.

Second, currently to cover the cost of the new truck, we have used our Community Improvement Board (CIB) allocations to pay for the amount that will be reimbursed to this fund once the truck has been delivered.

Those CIB funds are a major source of our funds in case we have an emergency that requires immediate infrastructure repair. The sooner we purchase the truck, the sooner we are able to reimburse the CIB fund and have those funds available if they are needed.

We have talked about this for months, and I have not heard one adversarial comment toward the purchase, thus I hope you will give serious consideration to moving forward with this tonight.

You will also have the third reading on the approval of the four-county district Solid Waste Plan. Since no questions have been posed, I hope this is satisfactory and you will approve its passage so the plan can hopefully be implemented district-wide.

PUBLIC HEARING #2 CITY OF JACKSON WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT IMPROVEMENTS PHASE I PROJECT

Jackson Municipal Building, 145 Broadway Street, Jackson, Ohio July 14, 2014 at 6:30 PM

1. PURPOSE OF MEETING

The purpose of this meeting is to provide specific information about the City's proposed project and the Residential Public Infrastructure Grant (RPIG) Program application that is currently being finalized.

2. EXISTING PROBLEM

The existing wastewater treatment plant is inadequate and unable to treat wastewater adequately during wet weather flow conditions. The City of Jackson is under a Consent Order from the OEPA to make improvements to the wastewater treatment plant.

3. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project involves the consolidation of the two influent pumping stations and capacity increase to 12 MGD, removal and replacement of the main influent screen, a new pump station force main routed to a new flow splitter structure, refurbishment of two final clarifiers including structural repairs and weir brackets, an oxidation ditch motorized influent gate and instrumentation control, new aerated sludge holding tank and aeration supply, upgrade of the mixing system of the existing sludge holding tank from mechanical to diffused aeration, and replacement of the digested sludge pump.
