APPROVAL OF AUDITOR'S REPORT

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

COMMITTEE REPORTS

UTILITY-No report Mr. Sheward was asked if any changes had been made to the light on Main St. at Tractor Supply. Mr. Sheward said he knew it had been discussed, but didn't know the outcome of the conversation.

POLICE CHIEF- No report

MAYOR- Mayor Heath said they are to start any day on the drainage work at ManPower Park. In a week or two the plans for sidewalk will be ready for bids. The parking lot at Mound Street is still being worked on and isn't lined yet.

Jackson County is now the first of our 88 counties in Ohio for having the highest Opioid drug count. Mayor Heath expressed his respect for Chief Potter and the police force and the job they do. Crime increases with this drug problem and we need to show support for the police department as the battle gets tougher; and support our city and its needs.

Mayor Heath also expressed his gratitude for the community support and prayers during his four hour surgery. He said he had great care and is doing remarkably well.

SERVICE SAFETY DIRECTOR

Fire Department reported a letter from the engineer. They are ready for a bid for McCarty Lane. The Northside water/drainage project is ready to begin as they have received an acceptable bid. Commissioners are meeting tomorrow morning. The Pavement is slipping by Walmart. It wasn't supposed to do that. The asphalt was a type of super pave and shouldn't have started slipping. It is likely to continue to get worse in this hot weather.

Board of control meeting approved to purchase new dumpsters.

Mr. Peters asked Mr. Sheward about Peak Shaving, and what is in place to let users know when it's peak time. Mr. Sheward said there isn't a way to let homes know when. But on hot days to cut back.

Mr. Kitchen asked about the recent glitches in the electric in the city. The upgraded system is supposed to have a recloser after the 3rd time and burn out. But they are having a difficult time finding where it is originating. Also the windy weather is blowing the wires and could be contributing to the glitches as well.

ORDINANCE NO 32-19

First Reading

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT AND TO EXECUTE DEEDSO AS TO CONVEY THE JACKSON SHORT LINE RAILROAD TO THE OHIO RAIL DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Mr. Kitchen made a motion to adopt the ordinance. Mr. Elliott seconded it. In a voice vote all members agreed.

Mr. Kirby explained that the railroad known as the Jackson Short Line Railroad that runs through the city of Jackson while does provide some economic benefits is expensive to operate. We acquired the railroad with grant funds, and would be required to pay them back should we ever sell the property. Our total repayment is over \$800,000.00 which is greater than the land is valued. We have made an agreement to transfer ownership to the State of Ohio Rail Development Commission (ORDC) who will continue to operate the railroad, and we are relieved of our obligation to repay the grants.

RESOLUTION NO. 25-19

First Reading

A RESOLUTION OF THE LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF JACKSON, OHIO TO ACCEPT THE BID OF WAUGH CONSTRUCTION, LLC IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$92,000 FOR THE REPLACEMENT OR REPAIR OF THE LIFT STATION SERVICING THE ACEY AVENUE AREA AS IT WAS THE LOWEST AND BEST RESPONSIVE BID SUBMITTED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
