APPROVAL OF MINUTES~ Some Ordinance numbers from last meeting were duplicates and had to be changed. Mr. Ondera made a motion to change Ordinance numbers 34-22 and 35-22 to 37-22 and 38-22 respectively and to reflect this in the minutes. Mr. Newkirk seconded this motion. In a voice vote, all members agreed.

CITY AUDITOR/ TREASURER~ Several in the packets concerning appropriations. He will speak about them as they come up.

FIRE CHIEF~ No Report

POLICE CHIEF ~ All 4-way stop signs are up. He and the PD have been out monitoring. They haven't written any citations but have given warnings. There haven't been any crashes and he feels the flow is better. There isn't any back up of traffic and the speed has slowed down on High St., as people are not trying to beat a light any longer.

Mr. Reed asked if the stop sign on Bridge headed out of town is necessary. Couldn't that be a continuous right turn? Chief Hinsch said he is favor of the stop. It only takes a second for traffic to stop and then turn

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right. There are a lot of kids in that area and bus stops. This slows down the traffic and makes it safer.

Mr. Swackhammer said the administration has discussed changing the stop light at David and South and the one at Burlington and Huron to four way stops also. Chief Hinsch said he would be in favor of this change also.

MAYOR~

- Skate park Have finished the project at the skate park from the grant we received. The kids that
 originally wrote to the mayor asking for some new equipment have been invited to a dedication on
 Wednesday afternoon.
- Downtown streets will be closing on Saturday morning as they begin setting up for the Apple Festival.

Project Updates:

- E. Broadway paving has been awarded by ODOT to Shelley & Sands. We still don't know the time frame on this. The cost came in \$250k over the engineer estimate. The city would have had to make up this difference. We asked ODOT to look at it again. They had to take it back to their board to approve the cap increase. We are still hoping to have it paved this fall, but are not sure.
- ODOT 93 paving will begin after the Apple Festival.

SERVICE DIRECTOR~

- Mr. Swackhammer asked the police chief to comment on the letter he sent to the public regarding responsible appropriate actions during the Apple Festival.
 - Chief Hinsch said he posted a letter on the JPD Facebook page. He said that the parking on the streets in front of houses in the city belongs to the city not the homeowner. They are not allowed to block these spots off with anything to save their spots for parking during the Apple Festival. It is public parking. It is a violation of city ordinances and ORC to block these spots with other things. He said this is an early warning to the residents that this will not be tolerated. If there is a street obstruction, it will be impounded and the homeowner will be cited.
- ODOT traffic signal project is almost finished. They will finish the paving mid-week and all
 forms and stakes will be removed. There are a few places that won't be finished, and these will be
 marked off with caution tape and cones.
- Mr. Berridge had asked the city to apply for the EPA Environmental Assessment because it would be free. However, they found this is no longer the case. Since this project is between Mr. Berridge and the Port Authority, administration feels it will need to be worked out between these two entities. The city was only involved because we thought it would be free.
- Have talked to Columbia Gas. The sidewalks will be completely re-poured when they are finished with their projects.
- Cemetery looking into alternative staffing. We have posted to outsource the mowing for the 2023 mowing season. The bids will be up at the end of September. Administration will look into this to see if this will help the city with the shortage of employees we face for mowing and help us financially. Seasonal help goes back to school each year and there are still a couple of months of mowing left. They are short handed right now. Have discussed with the Sheriff department to use inmates to do the weedeating. There are over 14,000 headstones that need weedeated around. However, the Sheriff department is short staffed on Correction Officer's to supervise this. This will not work out currently.

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• The mayor asked the chief if they are enforcing an existing Ordinance for the blocking off the street for parking. Chief said it is the Street Obstruction Ordinance. It was asked if there is anything against putting out chairs and ropes in the yards in front of the sidewalks. The chief said they do not regulate this unless there is a dispute. Nothing forbids this. Mr. Reed said this has been an issue in the past. It is the city right of way, not the homeowner's property. However, the homeowner must mow it. They have let the homeowner's place these items out in front of their
